 - c. Western Sector-South. IIc Room E.2 after removal of clay floors exposing bedrock beneath with worked circular holes; door with stone threshold to Room E.1 on left. From the west.
 - d. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): retaining Wall 508 on construction fill and stone slabs in Main Cleft beneath (Deposit AC) with Steps 510 and 512 to Western Square; Upper Western Road (IIc): retaining Walls 524 and 525; IIa–b Drain 005 bordering road on right. - Pl. 7. a. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): retaining Wall 511 with Steps 510 and 512 to Western Square; construction fill Deposit AC in Main Cleft not yet excavated. Upper Western Road (IIc): retaining Wall 524. From the northeast.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): Steps 510 and 512; portion of Wall 526 in upper left over Step 510. From the west.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): retaining Wall 508/509 resting on foundation slabs. From the northwest.
 - d. Western Sector-South. Spring Chamber: interior with early (II?) Wall 529 on bedrock edge of chamber with MBA–LBA walls above. From the east.
- Pl. 8. a. Western Sector-South. Spring Chamber: interior with early (II?) Wall 529 on bedrock.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Spring Chamber: interior with early (II?) Wall 529 on bedrock.

 - c. Western Sector-South. Room EF.2 with Walls 505 and 504 (IIb) and sloping bedrock beneath; Room E.1 with Walls 515 and 534 (IIc); entrance to House D Corridor with Walls 537 and 551 (IIIb). From the northeast.
 - d. Western Sector-South. IIb Room EF.2 with Wall 504 running into unexcavated baulk; eastern corner of Room E.1 with Walls 515 and 518 (= 534) (IIc). From the northeast.
- Pl. 10. a. Western Sector-South. IIa terrace Wall 523 with pathway paving; Wall 533 of Room ED.3 (IIIa) and Rooms D.2–3 (IIIb). From the northwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. IIb hearth **II-351** in bedrock depression at south end of yard between Houses EC and EF beneath clay floor of Room E.2 (IIc). From the north.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Yellow clay floor of Room E.2 (IIc) after removal of upper hearth (II-414), baked clay surface for hearth still in place; fragments of earlier hearth II-351 beneath, belonging to IIb yard. From the north.
 - d. Western Sector-South. Beneath Room E.2 (IIc) with depression in bedrock after removal of lower hearth II-351 in IIb yard; Wall 501 with blocked doorway (= 516) of Room EC.1 (IIb) and Room E.2 (IIc). From the northeast.
- Pl. 11. a. Western Sector-South. Northern corner of Room EC.1 (IIb) with Wall 502 and return beneath LBA Room C.3. From the southeast.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Wall 503 with return (502?) southwest of Room EC.1 beneath later MBA (Wall 34) and LBA (Wall 13) walls. From the north.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Upper Western Road (IIc): cobbled road surface with flanking Drain 005. From the southwest.
 - d. Western Sector-South. Upper Western Road (IIc): western corner of cobbled road surface with end ofDrain 005 turning northeast into Drain 007. From the west.

- Pl. 12. a. Western Sector-South. Upper Western Road (IIc): cobbled paving and flanking Drain 005 with turn to northeast and start of Drain 007. From the northwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Upper Western Road (IIc): cobbled road surface over top of retaining Wall 526. From the southeast.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Upper Western Road (IIc): road paving removed, exposing top courses of retaining Walls 524, 526, and 512 with earlier IIb Step 510 of Lower Western Road. From the northwest.
- Pl. 13. a. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): retaining Wall 508 and stepped ascent to Western Square (Steps 510 and 512); Upper Western Road (IIc): retaining Walls 526, 524, and reused Step 512. From the northwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): retaining Wall 508 and Steps 510 and 512 (lower courses). Upper Western Road (IIc): foundation courses of retaining Wall 526. From the southwest.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Lower Western Road (IIb): retaining Wall 508 and bottom Step 510. Upper Western Road (IIc): foundation courses of retaining Wall 526. From the northwest.
- Pl. 14. a. Western Sector-South. IIc Room E.1 (Walls 517, 514, 518, and 515) with exterior door to yard and stone threshold to Room E.2. IIIa House ED in background (Rooms ED.3 with schist bin, Room ED.2 and door to courtyard). From the south.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Room E.1 (IIc): Wall 517, stone threshold to Room E.2, upper clay floor with circular stone hearth, and section of floor excavated to bedrock with drilled hole. From the southeast.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Room E.1 with Walls 514 and 517 (IIc): doorway to yard, stone threshold to Room E.2, upper clay floor with door pivot stone. IIb terrace Wall 507 with portion of paving. Section of room excavated to bedrock exposing IIa cut Drain 001. From the east.
- Pl. 15. a. Western Sector-South. IIc Room E.1: Walls 517, 514, 518; doorway to yard; and upper clay floor with pivot stone. IIb terrace Wall 507 with yard paving and removal of leveling fill beneath yard to bedrock. From the southeast.
 - b. Western Sector-South. IIIa fill/debris Deposit AV above upper clay floor of Room E.1 (IIc). View through doorway from yard into Room E.1 (Walls 514 and 517) with upper clay floor and pivot stone in situ. From the northwest.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Western corner of Room E.1 (IIc) with Walls 514 and 517, upper clay floor (location of marble figurine SF-226 buried in floor), and doorway to yard with pivot stone. From the east.
- Pl. 16. a. Western Sector-South. Northern corner of Room E.1 (IIc) with Walls 514 and 518. From the south.b. Western Sector-South. Room E.1 (IIc): upper clay floor with circular stone hearth; test through clay floors to bedrock. From the southwest.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Eastern corner of Room E.1 (IIc) with Walls 518 and 515 and circular stone hearth; tests beneath clay floors and earlier IIa–b yard fill to expose sloping bedrock. From the southwest.
- Pl. 17. a. Western Sector-South. Northern corner of Room E.2 (IIc): lower clay floor, Wall 517 abutting Wall 514, and doorway to Room E.1 with stone threshold and door pivot. From the south.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Northern corner of Room E.2 (IIc): upper clay floor flush with top surface of stone threshold, Walls 514 and 517. From the southeast.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Northern corner of Room E.2 (IIc): upper clay floor with Wall 517 abutting Wall 514; view through doorway to Room E.1. From the southwest.
- Pl. 18. a. Western Sector-South. House E (IIc) upper clay floor: doorway with stone threshold from Room E.2 (Walls 514, 517) to Room E.1 (Walls 514 and 518). From the southeast.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Stamped hearth II-414 in Room E.2 (IIc) with portion of upper yellow clay floor dug away for hearth's removal. On right: exposed bedrock sloping down to west beneath Room E.2 after removal of Deposits AP (IIc) and AG (IIb); Room E.2 Wall 514 sitting on foundation of paving slabs over IIb yard. From the northeast.

- Pl.18. c. Western Sector-South. Stamped hearth II-414 with upper clay floor of Room E.2 (IIc); clay floors dug away in front of hearth exposing bedrock below. From the north.
 - d. Western Sector-South. Back end of stamped hearth II-414 abutting stone slab in Room E.2; schist discs on upper clay floor. From the northeast.
- Pl. 19. a. Western Sector-South. Room E.2 (IIc): south corner of room with Walls 515 and 501 and slab abutting blocked doorway (= 516). (Hearths II-414 and II-351 beneath it in bedrock depression have been removed.) From the northwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Room E.2 (IIc): detail of Wall 501 and door-blocking (= 516). From the northeast.
 - c. Western Sector-South. South corner of Room E.2 (IIc): Walls 515 and 501 with blocked doorway (= 516); clay floors excavated to bedrock exposing depression for IIb hearth II-351 (now removed). From the northeast.
- Pl. 20. a. Western Sector-South. South corner of Room E.2 (IIc): Walls 515 and 501 with blocked doorway (= 516); bedrock cut back to form foundation for Walls 515 and 501. From the northeast.
 - b. Western Sector-South. Northwest Yard of House E (IIc): terrace Wall 521 northwest of Room E.2 beneath MBA wall and drain. From the southwest.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Cobbled surface of III Western Roadway and construction fill beneath (= Deposit AY) over retaining walls and surface of earlier Western Road; southwest portion of Western Roadway removed to uncover II Drain 005 and Pathway. From the southwest.
- Pl. 21. a. Western Sector-South. III Western Roadway cobbled surface over IIc Upper Western Road, Drain 005, and Pathway. From the north-northwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. III Western Roadway over construction fill Deposit AY (IIIa), which in turn is above IIc Upper Western Road, Drain 005, and Pathway. From the northwest.
 - c. Western Sector-South. Rooms E.1–2 (IIc) in foreground; Rooms ED.2–3 (IIIa) in background. Room D.2 (IIIb) floor paving on top of earlier House ED Wall 534 (IIIa). From the southwest.
- Pl. 22. a. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.3 and Room ED.2 with Walls 536, 532, 537, and threshold (top of IIb Wall 505) from courtyard to Room ED.2. From the southwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. IIIb House D Corridor entrance with suggested level of threshold and Walls 537 (upper courses) and 531; construction fill Deposit BI beneath floor of House D in Room ED.2. IIIa Room ED.2 with entrance threshold and Wall 537. IIb Room EF.2 with Walls 504–505 and covered Drain 002. From the west.
 - c. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.2 with stone Platform 538 and Walls 532 and 534. IIc Room E.1 in background and IIb Room EF.2 Wall 504 disappearing into baulk. From the northeast.
 - d. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.2 with Walls 534 and 532 and stone Platform 538. From the east.
- Pl. 23. a. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.3 with Walls 536 and 532 and schist bin with covering slabs. From the southwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. IIIa House ED: Room ED.3 with Walls 536, 532, 534, and schist bin. IIIb House D: Room D.2 paving on top of Wall 534; Corridor Wall 551/551' with doorway between. From the northwest.
 - c. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.3 with schist bin (covering slabs in place) and Walls 536 and 532. From the west.
- Pl. 24. a. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.3: schist bin with cover slabs removed, walls of bin resting on schist slabs; Walls 536 and 532. From the northwest.
 - b. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.3: schist bin and Walls 533 and 536. From the south.
 - c. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.3: northern corner of room with Deposit BJ, including pithos rim **III-196** and tankard **III-319**, and Walls 533 and 536; schist fill Deposit BL for construction of IIIb House D above not yet excavated. From the south.
 - d. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.4: Walls 536, 533, and 535; stone lids/discs, sorted and stacked by the excavators, from collapse debris Deposit BO from upper floor above Room ED.4. From the northeast.

- Pl. 25. a. Western Sector-South. IIIa Room ED.4: exterior face of Wall 533 with jog of wall to Room ED.3. From the north-northwest.

PREFACE

The University of Cincinnati excavations of the Bronze Age harbor town of Ayia Irini on Kea under the direction of John L. Caskey began in the summer of 1960. The archaeological promise of the site had already been known for some time prior to this (Caskey 1962, 266–268, n. 6), on the basis of wall remains and sherds eroding from the exposed scarps of the promontory and the modern road cutting through the northern periphery of the prehistoric settlement. Surface sherds of Early Bronze Age (EBA) date had been noted even before excavations began (Scholes 1956, 11); Caskey's own special interest in this period would not be disappointed by the subsequent finds made at the site between 1961 and 1976.

The first full season of excavation in 1961, after the preliminary tests of the previous year, opened a deep sounding in the Western Sector of the site adjacent to Late Bronze Age (LBA) House C. This test reached Early Bronze II (EB II) levels in Room 2 of House E that included a well-stratified sequence of floor levels and associated deposits. This sounding, begun by Elizabeth Schofield in 1961, was continued by John C. Overbeck in 1963. He removed Middle Bronze Age (MBA) and LBA strata to expose further the deeply stratified EB II remains in this area, including rooms of Period II House E (E.1 and E.2) and floor paving and walls of Period III House D immediately above.

In 1967 Caskey made a deep exploration on the eastern side of the site (Eastern Sector) beneath the lane between LBA House A and the Temple. The space afforded by the lane was too narrow to allow for more than a very limited investigation of earlier strata, but digging did reach a thick and distinct deposit of late EB II. It was this deposit found beneath Temple Lane that Caskey used as the basis for defining the late EB II ceramic phase at Ayia Irini, Period III (Caskey 1972, 370–372).

Full campaigns in 1968, 1969, and 1970 included further excavation in the Western Sector where the best-preserved remains of the EB II settlement had been found in earlier seasons. Mary Eliot continued in 1968 and 1969 the work begun by Schofield and Overbeck, in the area bounded by LBA Houses C to the southwest and F to the northeast; EB II levels were taken down to bedrock, and the rich stratigraphic sequence of at least five successive building phases was further revealed, comprising the Period II Houses E, EC, EF, and Period III Houses ED and D. Eliot completed in 1971 the excavation of almost all the remaining deposits of the EB II houses in the Western Sector, where they could be reached. The walls of these houses were now clearly defined and cleaned so that more detailed drawings could be made by the site architect Roger Holzen.

In this same area just to the southwest of LBA House F, Leslie Preston (Day), in 1969 and 1970, excavated portions of the late EB II (Period III) Houses ED and D (Rooms ED.2, ED.4, and D.3), as well as scanty remains of drains and paving beneath the basement floors of House F itself, belonging to the earliest settlement phase of EB II Ayia Irini (Period IIa). In these same years, immediately to the northwest of the EB II houses, William Kittredge excavated a complex sequence of retaining walls, fills, and road surfaces that buried and covered over a very deep cleft in the bedrock (the Main Cleft). These remains were initially labeled as "Building XI," but later study resolved these finds into a large ramped and stepped entrance way (Western Road and Roadway) that led to the center of the settlement from the area of the Spring Chamber to the west.

In two seasons of limited supplementary excavation, further discoveries of the EB II settlement were made in the southeastern area of the promontory. In 1972 Overbeck, while investigating an MBA room beneath Room 3 of LBA House A, in the Southeastern Sector of the site, found beneath it remnants of an EB II house wall and associated deposits. This added to the deposits and fragments of walls of EB II date broadly distributed beneath the basement rooms of LBA House A that had been excavated by Elizabeth Caskey between 1961 and 1964. In 1976, Aliki Bikaki excavated a deep deposit of late EB II Period III beneath the alley between LBA Houses A and B. From beneath Room 2 of House B itself, she also discovered another extensive deposit and house walls

of the same period; this Period III deposit was mainly beneath modern water level at the southeastern edge of the promontory.

The brief preceding summary of the history of excavation of the EB II settlement remains at Ayia Irini highlights the number of project members responsible for this work in the field and the span of years over which it took place (1961–1976). The authors of this volume are indebted to them for the care they took in both the excavations themselves and their detailed recording of the finds; we relied heavily upon the excavation notebooks, end-of-season reports, and preliminary analysis of levels and finds of the numerous excavators involved. Many of these (Bikaki, Overbeck, Schofield) we were able to consult with directly about the EBA remains during six summer study seasons at Ayia Irini from 1982 to 1987. Mention of EBA walls and deposits have appeared in earlier volumes of the Keos series in their stratigraphic relation to later periods at Ayia Irini, and these have been referenced throughout this volume (Overbeck 1989: MBA Period IV; Davis 1986: later MBA Period V; Cummer and Schofield 1984: LBA House A; Schofield 2011: late MBA and LB I–II Periods V–VII in the Western Sector; Abell 2021: Alley AB and House B).

Another indispensable part of the excavation record is the detailed architectural plans of EBA walls, largely drawn by the site architects Roger Holzen and Lloyd E. Cotsen in the field, whose expert observations were an invaluable addition to those of the excavators. These plans and drawings formed the basis for Whitney Powell-Cummer's final plans and sections that are an integral part of this volume; they have been finalized and inked by Rosemary Robertson. The architectural plans and sections are further supplemented by hundreds of photographs, most taken by Caskey, both during the course of excavation and in subsequent cleaning and consolidation of the wall remains. A selection of these photos is published here, carefully chosen as the most illustrative of the wall and building remains and their associated deposits.

Caskey had intended to publish himself the latest Neolithic (Period I) and EB II (Periods II-III) settlement remains and associated finds from Ayia Irini; after his death in 1981, the responsibility for publication was undertaken by Mary Eliot and David Wilson. Eliot and Wilson collaborated closely on all aspects of the project during the six intensive summer study seasons. They were joined in their collaboration by Powell-Cummer in the second season, who worked closely with them over the next five summers drafting the final plans and sections that appear in this volume. To expedite the publication of the EBA settlement study, Wilson published the first of two planned volumes in 1999 (Wilson 1999: Keos IX.1), which presented the pottery and small finds from the Periods I-III settlements. A list of all the Periods I-III deposits was included in that volume, giving a tabular summary of their ceramic contents (minimum vessel numbers by ware and shape) and small finds (Wilson 1999, deposit content summaries: 167-226, small finds: 144-226). This second volume, Keos IX.2, comprising the architectural and stratigraphic analysis of the Periods I-III settlements, completes the publication of this study, providing a detailed analysis of the stratigraphic context and associated rooms and buildings to which they belong. Not included in Keos IX.1-2 are the EB II finds from beneath Temple Lane and the House B alley and Room 2; the final publication of these will be presented in the Temple volume (in progress) and have already been included in the House B volume (Abell 2021). The current volume had been substantially drafted and some sections finalized before Eliot's death in 2016; the coauthors were in general agreement on the phasing and interpretation of the settlement sequence as it is presented here.

We would like to thank two people in particular, Elizabeth (Liz) Schofield and Elizabeth Tucker Blackburn, for the invaluable help and support they provided us from the start of this project both in the initial field study at Ayia Irini and in the subsequent writing of this volume. Liz was always more than generous of her time in facilitating the EBA study during her tenure (1982–2005) as director of the Ayia Irini Excavations. Before her untimely death in 2005, Liz had given us lengthy and very detailed comments on an early version of this volume and was of special help in suggesting alternate interpretations of the evidence that we had not considered before. We very gratefully acknowledge the important contribution her support made: this is a better volume for it. There was no more selfless member of the Ayia Irini excavation archivist in Cincinnati and editor of the Keos series. The support she gave to all the team members, including the coauthors of this volume, was enormous.

We gratefully acknowledge the continued permissions granted by the Greek Archaeological Service over the long period of excavation and field study at Ayia Irini (1960–1987) and the unfailing support of the K' and KA'

Ephoreias and their successive ephors; this project would not have been possible without the generosity and goodwill of our Greek colleagues and friends. The Ayia Irini excavation and study seasons were carried out under the auspices of the American School of Classical Studies at Athens; the school directors, assistant directors, and administrative staff facilitated and supported in innumerable ways the execution of this field project. Last but not least we extend our thanks to the Department of Classics of the University of Cincinnati under whose sponsorship the Ayia Irini Excavations have been undertaken and supported over the many years since their inception. We would like to single out specially two other members of the Department at Cincinnati for their role in seeing the publication of the EBA project through to completion: Jack Davis, current director-of-record for the Ayia Irini Excavations and until recently head of the department; and the current Ayia Irini publication editor Carol Hershenson.

Funding for excavations conducted at Ayia Irini between 1960 and 1974, including those of the EBA levels described in this volume, came largely from the Semple Fund of the University of Cincinnati.
